




Process Overview & Timeline

What is the Miami Comprehensive Neighborhood Plan?

- Policy document setting community VISION and DIRECTION.
- Florida law requires local government to adopt a comprehensive plan.
- Miami Comprehensive Neighborhood Plan (MCNP) first adopted in 1989.
- Policies are driven by local issues (aspirations).



Why does the MCNP have to be updated now?

MCNP's last EAR process last occurred in 2015.

 All Florida comprehensive plans must undergo evaluation and appraisal review (EAR) every 7 years.

Proposed amendments are due to the State by October 31, 2023.




What is the Goal of the Update?

Why is the MCNP Important?

- Out of the **87** Items heard this year:
 - 7 Administrative
 - 60 used findings from Miami 21
 - 80 used finding from the MCNP
- Provides a roadmap for the next 10 years
- Allows for innovation
- Builds consensus
- Overall improves quality of life




Population Growth by Decade Crecimiento Poblacional por Década



Future Uso del Suelo Fiti zafè tè













Forthcoming

Types of Amendments:

- 1) Obsolete: amendments that are necessary because a goal, objective, or policy ("GOP") has become outdated
- 2) Aspirational: not required by any state or county provision; reflect the state of bestpractice or offered in response to feedback to stakeholder input
- *Other:* grammatical incorrections, changing conditions, inconsistencies, etc

- Update Level-of-Service

Potable Water Element


- LOS: 92.05 to 97.54 gallons per capita per day
- Water Supply Facilities Work Plan
 Update (Appendix PW-1)





Capital Improvement Element

- Obsolete: strikes financial feasibility
- Aspirational: visionary and strategic themes to guide decisions
 - Safety
 - Wellness & Quality of Life
 - Equity
 - Economic Return
 - Modernization of a Future City
- Updated LOS standards: POTABLE WATER, SANITARY SEWERS,
 STORM SEWERS, SOLID WASTE
- New Capital Improvement Plan





Sanitary and Storm Sewers Element

- Outdated policies updated
- Sanitary Sewers LOS: 122 gallons per capita per day





Natural Groundwater Aquifer Recharge Element (NGARE)

- Updated for changed conditions—increased saltwater intrusion to water table
- Update outdated policies





Education Element


- Update in County policies, e.g. impact fee requirements
- Update to reflect the need to address magnet schools
- Obsolete: objectives enforcing monitoring and evaluation (participation in school concurrency is now voluntary)





Ports, Aviation and Related Facilities Element

- Updates to remove outdated policies
- Update to help refine implementation of no-net-loss policy of marine industrial land
- Update to simplify monitoring and evaluation of element at request of the Miami River Commission









State Coordinated Review

- Second transmission for state agency review
- Summer 2024



Timeline

Appeal Period

- 30 days upon State Land Planning Agency from date of receipt
- Summer 2024

Notice of Intent to find package compliant

- Adoption becomes official
- Summer 2024
